Postum and hiking—It's a natural arrangement

Some people enjoy walking a couple of miles for the exercise. But how about a 4,500 mile trek to promote the wholesomeness of hiking?

More than 70 backpackers did just that during the yearlong Pacific-to-Atlantic Postum Hikanation, which officially ended in Washington, D.C., on May 13.

GF sponsored Hikanation through Postum instant grain beverage-and it was a natural arrangement. The theme of the odyssey noted that Hikanation and Postum are "Natural. Like the Great Outdoors." The link was ideal-Postum, a 100 per cent natural blend of wheat, bran, and molasses, sponsoring outdoor hiking as a wholesome form of recreation.

Much of the Hikanation success was thanks to the efforts of GFers Deborah Edwards, product manager; Mark Kapsky, associate product manager, and Chuck Merlini, category manager.

Hikanation was the brainchild of Jim Kern, president of the American Hiking Society, and was sanctioned by the U.S. Department of the Interior. Jim organized the hike to call attenhikers who made it to the end. tion to the popularity of hiking and its

The popularity of hiking was demonstrated by the diversity of the

place in a low-energy future. GF had two objectives in supporting the hike: first, to generate increased awareness of Postum, and second, to

convey the natural, wholesome and healthful image of the product.

Considering the extensive national publicity that Hikanation has received, it appears that the goals of both the American Hiking Society and GF have been met. Coverage of this event was included in such TV programs as Good Morning America and PM Magazine, many local TV and radio news shows. and thousands of newspaper articles. Undoubtedly, thousands of Americans are more aware now of the natural goodness of Postum and of hiking.

The media followed the hikers throughout their transcontinental trek, which began a year ago, April, when 10,000 hikers crossed the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge. Thirteen
